**Rector's Report**

- VBS went well. Not as many kids as last year but a good group. St. Paul's Men helped put the church back together after the overnight for Irene Swenson's memorial.
- We will hold a memorial service for Kathleen Gork on August 13.
- Ministry Sunday is September 11. There will be one service at 9 am. ECW is working on the food.
- One Light Interfaith Los Angeles event to remember and heal from 9/11 will be held on September 10. Steve and Julia Armitage will attend to represent the LA Diocese and St. Paul's.
- Sunday School registration will begin on September 18.
- Each vestry member will give his/her Stewardship talk at both services from now until the bishop comes in November.
- Blessing of the Animals will be on October 4 at 5pm.
- We will be doing a Fundraiser at Medrano's in the month of August. You must present the coupon at ordering and St. Paul's will receive 20% of the cost of your meal.
- The pest control company has been successful in reducing the squirrel population and the tree is recovering. However, the squirrels are returning, so pest control will come back out.
- Chili Cook-Off will be held on September 17 from 5:30 to 7:30pm. Prizes for best chili and for best costume.
- Vestry dinner at the homeless shelter will be September 1.
- Sewer backed up at the rectory and was \$75 to repair. Garage door broke the following week, trapping both cars inside, \$198 to repair. Dana Haycock will look into a home warranty policy.
- Rev. Nancy had a good time at CREDO in Louisiana. It gave her an opportunity to focus on her physical, emotional, spiritual and financial well being.
- Holly & Rose Tea info will be posted on website and Facebook after the Chili Cook-Off.

**Treasurer's Report**

- Reports were distributed and discussed.
- A meeting was held with a representative from Chase Bank about the options of direct deposit for the payroll checks.
- Mission Share is 4 months behind.
- We have collected \$349 towards the lamb at the fair so far.
- VBS income was \$606 and after all expenses are paid there should be enough to pay for the Sunday School curriculum.
- Rector's Discretionary Fund has over \$600 with about \$100 in anticipated expenses.
- We have seen some new families at both the 8 am and 10:30 am services.
- Treasurers' report will be filed for audit.

**Old Business**

- Stewardship Campaign this year is themed "We Walk By Faith." Nancy Takeda has been working on the menu.
- Holly & Rose Tea is building enthusiasm. We have had lots of tea cups donated already. The September 18 coffee hour will feature a tea tasting. There will be two boxes for each table, containing everything needed for each seating. Julia and Steve Armitage have volunteered to be the box organizers and to do inventory. There will be ten 6-foot tables and five round ones. Invitations (donated by Luran Hunt) will go out the first week in September. Dana Haycock is working with

kikaPaprika, the fashion show people, to arrange a pre-show for everyone who is working. Dana has also purchased a new dishwasher from Lowe's with some of the donated funds.

**New Business**

- Steve Armitage obtained a swamp cooler estimate of \$18,000 for a unit on the roof with ducting to the office building and the Guild Hall. Discussion was held on replacing the existing AC, one concern being the ducting may be a large part of the problem. Charles Wordsworth will contact FJ Heating & AC for another quote.

**Buildings and Grounds**

- The air conditioner in the office building ceased to function and FJ Heating/Air checked it out. It was discovered that the padlock on the fuse box had been cut and the fuse removed and placed on top. Fuse was reinstalled and the system works fine. Seems that the padlock was cut previously due to rust on it. Question is why would vandals just leave the fuse so easily available? Padlock has been replaced. FJ came back out at the end of July and checked all the air-conditioning systems. They replaced the fuse box for the office building as it was beginning to warp. Total cost was \$198.70 which included \$78.70 for the new fuse box.
- The bees are back on the nursery playground. It has been five months since we have had any. Kreutel's Bug Killers came back and fumigated and sealed the tree, but, some were still seen so they were called back out. Area is now clear of bees and the bill for service was \$70.
- We have had some dry patches of grass. The gardener has been asked to check out the sprinkler systems. The lawns are looking much healthier now.
- The locking system on the front door of the church has become increasingly more difficult to operate because of wear in the Allen key locking system. It will be investigated as to how to fix this problem. There was a discussion of the feasibility of installing a dead bolt that would work with a regular key.

- Vestry is hosting dinner on September 1 at the shelter. Suggested menu is spaghetti, green salad and bread.

- About 70 people have expressed interest in attending the JetHawks game on August 12. Game starts at 7 pm but the festivities begin at 6:15 pm.

- Chili Cook-Off will be September 17.

- Dick Elton shared a sample imprinted calendar, but we already sell the church calendar. He also gave an update on Willis Chase.

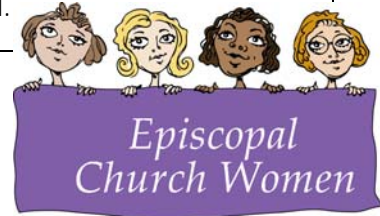

**GETTING TO KNOW THE SAINTS****St. Vincent de Paul (1580-1660)****French****Feast Day: September 27**

Most of us have heard of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, its thrift shops and work among the poor, but we probably give little thought to the man who gave his name to this work. Vincent was born in the Gascony region of France in 1580 to a poor family.

Because he was an intelligent boy he was sent to be educated by the Franciscans. He was ordained by the age of 20 and at first only thought of having a successful career as a priest. However, while on a sea voyage he was taken prisoner by African pirates and sold as a slave in Tunis, now the capital of Tunisia.

With God's help he was able to escape and some time later became the priest and tutor in a noble household where he came in contact with the peasants on the lord's estate. One of the peasants confessed to him on his deathbed that his previous confessions had been false. This may have been the catalyst to invigorate Vincent's career because after this he became zealous in preaching repentance, confession, and God's love and forgiveness. His preaching attracted so many penitents that other priests had to come and assist him. He not only ministered to the poor but also to the wealthy. He was called to preach at a church whose parishioners were aristocrats and he had similar success in turning their hearts to repentance. When the wealthy expressed the wish to amend their lives, he organized them into a Confraternity of Charity and set them to work caring for the poor and sick in hospitals and in home visits. After he returned to Paris he ministered to prisoners who were destined to be galley slaves.

Eventually he formed a group known as the Lazarists, a community of priests who renounced ecclesiastical advancement and devoted themselves to work in the small towns and villages of France. In an age in which Protestants were often persecuted, he told his followers that Protestants

were their brothers and should be treated with respect and love. In 1633 the Archbishop of Paris gave him the Priory of St. Lazare as a headquarters. St. Vincent said of the priory: "This house was formerly used as a retreat for lepers, and not one of them was cured. Now it is used to receive sinners, who are sick men covered with spiritual leprosy, but are cured by the grace of God. Nay, rather, they are dead men brought back to life. What a joy it is to think that the house of St. Lazare is a house of resurrection! Lazarus, after he had been four days in the tomb, came out alive, and our Lord who raised him up still gives the same grace to many who, after staying here some days as in the grave of Lazarus, come out with a new life."

Vincent complained to the King that positions in the Church were being distributed as political favors while the appointees' spiritual qualifications were ignored. The King created a council to remedy the matter and asked Vincent to be its head.

St. Vincent's works were too numerous to list here. His main focus was charity toward all persons, from abandoned children to the aged. The Sisters of Charity, who nursed the sick and the poor, owe their existence to St. Vincent de Paul. He said of them, "Their convent is the sick-room, their chapel the parish church, their cloister the streets of the city." "When Vincent saw how many babies were abandoned in Paris every year, he established an orphanage and often wandered in the slums, looking for abandoned babies.

No matter how many duties claimed his attention, the soul of this humble man was not inflated by the honors of the great, but was always intimately joined to God. The "Apostle of Charity", St. Vincent de Paul, died in Paris at the age of eighty. His feast day is September 27th. He is the patron of charitable societies.

**Prayer** (contemporary language)

"Almighty God, who called your servant Vincent de Paul to serve you in the person of those in need: Grant that we, following his example, may fulfill your commandments by defending and supporting the poor, and by loving you with all our hearts, through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

We all know that St. Paul's is not a wealthy parish, but I am constantly amazed by the willingness of parishioners to step up to the plate when necessary. Recently, we received a quote of \$6,800 for the replacement of the heating and air-conditioning system in the Guild Hall. The old system was by far the oldest one in our facility and was becoming increasingly difficult to repair with each system failure. In addition, it was extremely inefficient, using roughly twice as much electricity and gas as a new one. The real crisis arose when we were informed of a serious potential for carbon monoxide leaks due to the age of the heating system and the likelihood that invisible hairline cracks can appear that can cause carbon monoxide to leak into the room.

Clearly, our 2011 deficit budget had no room in it for a \$6,800 expenditure, so I presented the problem to the parish on Sunday morning, September 18. By the end of the day, we had an anonymous donation of \$5,000 toward this project, making it possible to proceed. The remaining \$1,800 will come from memorial donations, most of which had already been designated for the Guild Hall work by Irene Swenson's family. We are all very grateful to the anonymous donor and the Memorial Fund donors who made it possible for us to do this work. The new system is already up and running and saving us energy. Thank you to all who contributed to this project!

Our day-to-day financial situation is not quite what we would like it to be. As you are probably aware, we began the year with a deficit budget, and that continues to be reflected in our income and expenses. At this point in the year, our expenses exceed our income by approximately \$8,000. It is always a balancing act for the treasurers to decide what bills must be paid and what bills can wait for another week or so. As a result, we have, on occasion, had to dip into our reserves to meet our basic expenses. This is obviously not what we would like to be doing, but some bills simply must be paid in a timely fashion for us to continue to operate. Please consider prayerfully what amount you will pledge for the operating year 2012.

Bishop Diane Bruce will be joining us on Saturday evening, November 12, for our main Stewardship event. She is a dynamic speaker, and this is a wonderful opportunity for all of us at St. Paul's to get to know her. We will begin with a service of the Holy Eucharist at 5:00 p.m., with Bishop Diane presiding and preaching, followed by dinner in the Guild Hall provided by the Vestry. Everyone in the parish is invited and encouraged to be a part of this important and exciting occasion.



### *A daily reminder*



Make this bookmark to remind you that God is with you every day.

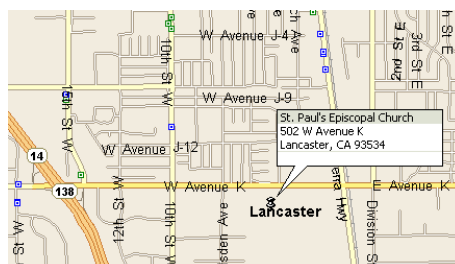
